We hear it explained during Initiation Ceremonies for new members − below is that segment of the ceremony. So if you haven't attended one in awhile, this is a refresher. ☺

#### The American Legion Auxiliary Emblem

The emblem of the American Legion Auxiliary is your badge of distinction and honor. It stands for God and country, and the highest rights of mankind. It consists of several parts and each part has a meaning. The rays of the sun that form the background stand for the

principles of the American Legion Auxiliary: Loyalty, Justice, Freedom and Democracy – dispelling the darkness of violence, strife and evil. Unity and Loyalty are represented by the unbroken circle of blue. The field of white exemplifies the hope of Freedom. The star of blue is the emblem of service in war. It is no less the emblem of service in time of peace.

"The emblem of the American Legion Auxiliary is the emblem of Americanism. Americanism is unity of love, singleness of allegiance, practicality of purpose, care of the distressed, and the education of children, all directed to the promotion of a common good. As members of this organization, we must preach and teach the principles of Americanism. Let us not forget that to each generation comes its patriotic duty and that upon your willingness to sacrifice and endure as those before you have sacrificed and endured, rests the hope of the nation."

## From the Secretary's Pad...



*Girls State . . .* the 2012 session is now full. All 300 applications have been awarded to Units. If your Unit missed out on participating this year and still want to contribute to the program; the Unit can make a donation to the session by mailing

a check to Department marked GS donation.

We still do not have any Orientation information for the 15<sup>th</sup> District! As soon as I have that information we will post the Orientation list on the web site.

Check your Plans of Action for deadline to have completed applications to Department. Make sure all legible and complete before returning them to Department. Incomplete applications will not be accepted.

Unit Information Form . . . All Units will receive a Unit information form listing the address we currently have on file for the Unit and asking what dues will be for the 2013 membership year. Every Unit MUST return this form indicating any change to the Unit address and the amount of the Unit's dues. Remember, the dues must match what we have on file in the Unit's Constitution & Bylaws here at Department. If what you put on the form does not match the file, we will change your form.

**Department Convention** . . . If you have not made your reservation for Department Convention, please do so. Convention will be held at the Renaissance Orlando at SeaWorld from June 7, 2012 – June 10, 2012. Their reservation number is 800-266-9432 and the rate is \$129.

#### Department President's Homecoming . . .

Diane's Homecoming will be held at Post 219 in Fruitland Park on April 21, 2012. The flyer for her Homecoming is included in this Communiqué and is available on the Department web site.

**Membership** . . . we have been mailing out letters to all members of Units below 75% that have not paid their dues. We are receiving many phone calls telling us they have paid their dues indicating the Units are not processing to Department in a timely fashion. You must remit dues promptly once you receive it from a member. If a member of your Unit proves to Our office they have paid their dues we will process it and invoice the Unit.

Do not mail applications for wives of new Legion members until you are sure the Legion has processed the new **Legionnaires' dues.** We cannot process the Auxiliary member until the Legion processes the Legionnaire.

IRS Problems . . . In last month's Communiqué I gave the IRS address to write to change your fiscal year. You must include a cover letter listing your tax ID (EIN) request the change to July 1 – June 30 per enclosed documents and then enclose a copy of your Unit's Constitution & Bylaws highlighted where your fiscal year is to be the same as Departments and a copy of ours highlighted that it is July 1 – June 30. If you are unable to copy ours from the Unit guide you can request a copy from Department.

If your name is wrong, and most of them are, you need to write requesting that be fixed and to do that you must send a cover letter and a copy of your charter. All units must be registered with the IRS with their legal name, which is:

American Legion Auxiliary (Name on charter) Unit (Unit #) Inc. An example would be; American Legion Auxiliary Ocoee Memorial E-Unit 109 Inc. If your name is listed any other way it is incorrect and must be corrected.

All Units must renew their corporation by May. Once you have done so, mail a copy of the annual report to Department. Again, your name must appear as it does above and if it doesn't it is wrong and must be corrected.

Do not mail papers that you filed your 990 N. We need the report that shows your 990 N was accepted. Make sure your Unit name and # are on the paper when you mail it to Department. We have received many reports we are unable to identify what unit they are for.

Seven members from The Department of Florida attended the Southern Area Mission Training Conference held in Mobile Alabama. Mary Heenan, Shirley Fraser, Robin Briere, Lois McFall, Erna Schwabe, Gerri Bailey and myself. My expectation was to obtain information that would make me a more informed Auxiliary member.

I can say that I did acquire some information that I was not aware of, but the most prevalent thing I learned was that THE DEPARTMENT OF FLORIDA HAS OUTSTANDING PROGRAMS IN PLACE TO EDUCATE AND INFORM OUR MEMBERS. The information presented at the Southern Area Mission Training Conference was what we present at a Department Workshop. National Officers and Chairmen were the presenters and I feel that our Department Chairman do a more effective job of presenting the programs of The American Legion Auxiliary.

Department Boot Camp trains our Department Chairman. Under the guidance of Past Department Presidents and Department Secretary they prepare their Plans of Actions and presentations. The Department Chairman then presents the programs to the District Officers and District program chairman at Department Workshop. The next step is the District Chairman then presents the program Plans of Action to Unit Chairman and Unit members at the District School of Instructions. This progression in training allows every Auxiliary member in the State of Florida to have the information to successfully implement the programs of the American Legion Auxiliary. Department also offers to its members the ABC (Auxiliary Basic Concepts) School. This class informs members on how to run a meeting, the duties of Unit Officers and protocol do's and don'ts. If a District wants

to have an ABC School all you have to do is contact the Department Leadership Chairman. Break-out sessions are also offered at Fall Conference and Department Convention. For these education opportunities to be successful District Chairman and District Officers need to attend Department Workshop, and Unit Officers, Unit Chairman and Unit Members need to attend District Schools of Instructions. If you have attended one of these events in the past and feel you don't need to go again—WRONG! Each year could bring changes to programs, IRS rules and regulations, etc. We need to stay informed.

Am I sorry I spent the time and money to go to the Southern Area Mission Training? <u>Absolutely Not!</u> I did receive useful information, but most of all I came away with a great sense of pride in The Department of Florida on the educational opportunities we offer the Auxiliary membership of our State. Educating our communities about the particular challenges military children face with the deployment of a family member is one of the many goals of the American Legion Auxiliary. Located under "Gateway to



## <u>A Poppy On My Chest</u>



#### Thanksgiving with homeless veterans

It was a great day. NVHS volunteers held the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Thanksgiving Picnic in the Park and served Thanksgiving Dinner: dressing, salad, fruit cocktail, apples, turkey, ham, 2 kinds of taters, cranberry sauce, broccoli and cheese, string bean casserole, yummy gravy - all made by our dedicated volunteers and 4 kinds of pies - and our homeless heroes absolutely loved it!!!! They were so appreciative. All together at the park volunteers served close to 50 homeless, including 25 - 30 veterans - it was a great day. NVHS volunteers also cooked, served and delivered about 250 meals to veterans and their families in need.





I received the following information from Brenda Collins, Southern Division Children & Youth Chairman, which I would like to share with you.

April is Children and Youth Month

Children...Our Most Precious Natural Resource is the American Legion Family's national theme for "April is Children & Youth Month." We encourage your use and support of this theme in promotion of all your Children & Youth programs.

In 1938 April was formally designated as the Child Welfare Month but was later changed to Children & Youth Month and is continued still today. The American Legion each year asks us to get involved by teaching Child Health, Family Preservation or Child Safety. Let us all get involved with your units, post and other organizations to let everyone in your community know that the Children of today are our most precious natural resource.

We, as auxiliary members, can help the community by helping with a Child Safety Day. Ask your local police departments to help by having some of their officers come to participate.

- 1. A fingerprint person could come to your post and make fingerprints of the children for the parents to keep on file. If a tragedy happened the parents would have the prints to help with identifying their child.
- 2. An officer from Drug Control could speak and give out literature on drug abuse.
- 3. Another officer could talk about child abuse. Let the children know it's OK to tell an adult if someone touches them inappropriately.
- 4. Also ask someone to set up a digital photo station to make and print pictures of the child for the parents.
- 5. The fingerprints and picture should be placed in an envelope and clearly marked as to what is inside. The envelope should be given to the parents for safekeeping.

We pray that nothing will ever happen but we live in a society where things do happen. This is information all parents should have on file.

In January, I visited the Mailman Center in Miami. Upon asking if there was anything in particular that they were in need of, Director Daniel Armstrong said their current project is purchasing I pads for three and four year olds with Autism. Make your donations to the Mailman Center on the remittance form so we can assist with this project.

I also had the opportunity to take a tour of Miami Children's Hospital. Our guide, Ann Lyons explained the different areas of the hospital, which has 269 beds. The hospital was started in 1950 and was known as Children's Variety Hospital, which was later changed to Miami Children's Hospital. Ann asked if we were aware of the fact that there is talk about cutting Medicaid. She stated that 65% of their patients are on Medicaid, 25% have insurance and 10% are self-pay. If Medicaid is cut it will not only affect them but also All Children's Hospital. Let's contact our elected officials and let them know what could happen to our children. Our most precious natural resource, if Medicaid is cut.

While attending the Mission Training in Mobile Al. (which was definitely worth the 10 hour drive) we were informed that due to the privacy act it is not necessary to have the youth's date of birth on the Youth Hero applications. So if that has been the hold up on getting them sent to department let's get them done.

Keep on leaping for all the children!


