# From the Secretary's Pad...



Happy New Year! After being away for so long and having the office closed, we are getting back to normal here again. I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday and has a healthy 2012!

Girls State . . . The registration closes on February 1<sup>st</sup> and many Units have not sent in for a spot in this year's session of this writing. Keep in mind; girls get one chance in their lifetime to attend Girls State and if your Unit has sent girls from a particular high school for several years and all of a sudden stop, you will be disappointing girls that have been looking forward to this opportunity and will never have the chance again. Think carefully before giving up this very important program.

Following the close registration, over quota slots will be filled and then Units will be awarded extra slots even if they have not earned them based on their membership numbers per the Standing Rules. If your Unit has extra money and wants to send more girls to Girls State, send a check along with a completed form today!

**Orientations** . . . We are still waiting for Districts 1,7,11,13,14,15 & 16 to turn in their date request so a schedule can be put out. As soon a we have the information it will be posted on the web site and in the next Communique.

Compliance . . . Letters will be going out any day to Units that are not in compliance with the IRS and that are not incorporated with the State of Florida per our Bylaws. We have found many Units that are having a problem are due to either name or address discrepancies with the IRS. All Units' legal names are "American Legion Name on Charter Unit 123, INC" You must use this name for all legal business beginning with your checking account!! When you file your 990 N you have an opportunity to list DBAs (Doing business as) and this is where you would put ALA Unit 123 or "Your Town Name" Unit 123,

but these are only DBAs they are not your legal name! As an example; Unit 63 in Winter Garden's legal name is American Legion Auxiliary Hugh T Gregory Unit 63, INC. This name must appear on their check, 990 N, their Corporation, Solicitation Permit, and Tax Exemption etc. Their DBAs would or could be; Unit 63, Winter Garden Unit 63, ALA Unit 63, American Legion Auxiliary Unit 63 etc. You get the idea!

Another problem we have encountered is many municipalities have given streets Legion Posts are on names like Legion Way or American Legion Dr as a courtesy and they are not really the legal address of the property so the IRS does not recognize them when they get used on annual reports filed causing the reports to get rejected. You must always use the legal address of the property and if the Post home has moved, a letter must be sent to the IRS notifying them of the change of address so the Unit's records can be updated. Department is considered a third party with the IRS so the Unit must correspond with them directly on all Unit business.

All Units should have 2011 990 N reports on file with Department at this time. Any Unit able to file a 2011 report has an incorrect file year with the IRS and must get that corrected. All Units' fiscal year must be July 1 – June 30. If your Unit has any other fiscal year than this, please change by writing to the IRS Attn: EO Service Entity, MS 6273, Ogden UT 84211.

Corporation Renewals . . . are due beginning January 1 through May 2012. As soon as you file your renewal with the State, you must mail a copy of your report to Department for the Unit's file per the Department's Bylaws. If Department has renewed you Corporation and invoiced your Unit in the past do not assume we will automatically do it for you this year. You must request this from us if you want us to do so. The cost is \$62.50.


**Dues...** In the next couple of weeks each Unit will receive the form to report the correct dues amount for 2013 along with verifying the Unit's mailing

address. It is important that you remember that beginning with the first recap for the 2013 year Units will be mailing Department \$16.50 for each Senior member and \$3.00 for each Junior member. Make sure you are collecting enough dues to cover this per capita and the required quotas, Sock fee and Bonding Fee the Unit has to pay. If your Unit needs to make a change to the dues amount it must be handled by a Constitution and Bylaws change NOT a change to your Standing

**Rules!** If the revised documents are not in our office, signed by the Department Constitution and Bylaws Chairman, by the date we have to report dues amounts to National, your Unit will not be able to raise the Units for the new year. It is very important to handle this immediately!

The attendees are physically homeless or just getting into the subsidized housing program and were invited to this dinner by Denna who is the Homeless Veterans' Coordinator for the VA Clinic in Tallahassee. Department President Diane and her husband Chuck were there helping fill everyone's plates. And since President Diane was dressed somewhat like an Elf, she also filled in for the real Elf who didn't make it. Diane helped Santa distribute gifts to the children, posed for pictures with Santa, children, & families, and made the evening news on Channel 27, WTXL-ABC along with Commander Williams. Great job Havana 84!

#### Units in the 5th District

Unit 120, Holly Hill, received items from a business that was closing ... so they donated new shirts, sweat shirts, and hats totaling 65 pieces to the Homeless Veterans of Volusia County. By doing so, 21 veterans were supplied with new clothing ... and they were also put up in a hotel for two days during the Christmas Season.

Unit 270, Port Orange, received sheets, pillowcases and comforters donated by a local hotel chain ... so they donated them to Serenity House for Veterans.

In Jacksonville, at Atlantic Boulevard and Acme Street, a closed down nursing home has been refurbished as a homeless veterans shelter/home. Great opportunity here for Units to get involved!

#### **Liberty Manor**

Liberty Manor is located in the 15<sup>th</sup> District – at 10015 North 9<sup>th</sup> Street, Tampa. Liberty Manor was organized in 2006 as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization with the objective of promoting the developmental and social needs of veterans who have served our country and fought for our independence, but have fallen victim to homelessness. Department President Diane, along with 15th District President Mary and other members of the District, had the opportunity to visit Liberty Manor during her recent visit. CEO Connie Blaney, who helped establish this great shelter for homeless veterans, along with the veterans who were there that day graciously welcomed the visit. Liberty Manor is supported by many Units in the 15th District ... and is always in need of assistance. #### **Stand Down House**

Faith, Hope, Love, Charity, Inc. (FHLC) opened the doors of the Stand Down House in May 2000 to provide emergency/transitional housing and supportive services for veterans struggling with addictions, mental illness, PTSD, traumatic brain injuries and physical limitation. It is located at 4309 Davis Road in Lake Worth. In 2011, Stand Down House provided 8,719 emergency housing nights for 94 male veterans. Since opening, over 2,000 veterans have received supportive services. Recently homeless female veterans with children have been added to those being helped at Stand Down House. Department President Diane, along with 11th District President JoAnn and other members of the District, had the opportunity to visit Stand Down House during her recent visit. Executive Director & Co-Founder Roy Foster told us all about Stand Down House and took us on a tour of the facility. Units throughout the Department leaped into action over the Holidays hosting Christmas parties for the children.

Naples Unit 135 helped host the annual Christmas party for "Special Children." These "children" range in age from nineteen to seventy-five.

Dania Unit 304 adopted 53 foster kids ranging in age from 3 months to 12 years. They purchased \$2000.00 worth of gift cards for them

The 16<sup>th</sup> District Units adopted 14 National Guard families with a total of 29 children. They had fun shopping and filling the wish lists of the children.

Dunedin Unit 275 helped host the 31<sup>st</sup> annual Poker Run for foster kids in Pinellas and Pasco Counties. Funds raised enabled the purchase of 1800 bicycles for the kids.

LaBelle Unit 130 helped prepare and deliver 641 meals to needy families on Christmas Day.

Welcome to 2012....the year that Florida American Legion Auxiliary will "Leap to Success".

Over the past four months we have held seven ABC Schools and the turn out has been fantastic. There is still time to schedule an ABC school inyour District...just have the District Leadership Chairman contact me via <a href="mailto:leadership@alafl.org">leadership@alafl.org</a> or call me at 352-428-1649 to set a date.

Now here are some tips on *How-To Become an Effective Leader*Start by taking the National Leadership Course which is available online at <a href="https://www.alaforveterans.org">www.alaforveterans.org</a> and encourage others to do the same.

BE KNOWLEGEABLE – you do not have to be an expert on everything, but having the basic knowledge is essential. Be familiar with the documents that govern your Unit or committee; if you are faced with a difficult question know where to go and whom to ask... Follow the chain of command, Unit President first, she then goes to District President and District President then goes to Department President. Have a level of familiarity with all of the programs and be able to explain the general objectives of the program.

Having a working knowledge of Robert's Rules of Order can help leaders avoid much grief and avoid possible confrontational or embarrassing situations. Remember that minutes are important; if it is not in the minutes then it never happened. An effective leader will know the process for the spending and control of the Units finances. Bad financial practices not only hurt the unit but can also result in criminal charges.

BE WILLING TO LISTEN – be patient, understanding and respect other opinions

BE WILLING TO PARTICIPATE - take an active part in your Unit. Attend training workshops, committee meetings, social and public events.

BE DECISIVE, ENTHUSIASTIC AND INSIRATIONAL – motivate others by your enthusiasm. Follow up with your members to ensure that they are achieving the goals that have been established. Be a cheerleader and inspire others.

STAY OPEN – to new ideas and relationships...this means listening to common sense – the inner voice of reason and fairness. But you need to remember that success can keep us from staying open to new ideas. As a unit improves it is important to remember how people were able to accomplish their Shared Goals.

BIG PICTURE – It is important to keep a big picture perspective when your plan for organizational improvement is evolving. Without a vision, your efforts risk becoming fragmented and isolated. You need to have a lasting impact in a community. Look thru a new lens but seeking first to understand before being understood. The idea of of shifting from trying to make your argument or ideas heard to trying to understand another

members point of view is NOT easy but it does work. Changing your lens helps you to reframe your thinking.

ACTIONS, EVENTS and PEOPLE are interrelated – so ASK THE RIGHT QUESTIONS. It is not nearly as important to have the right answers as it is to ask the right questions. By this I mean that everyone needs to understand and buy into the ideas presented.

Telling members how to act or feel will not work nearly as well as finding the questions that will lead them one at a time to their own discoveries for example:

Who needs to be involved to make it work

How can we involve younger members

If we are successful, how will we know it

These questions start to frame a dialogue. Continue to question members until they understand the entire challenge. The more serious you are about being effective, the more precise our questions become.

It does not make a difference if you are a Unit of 10 or 2000 members... you need to avoid the "burnout" syndrome. Ask the members to buy into one concept; mentor one member, volunteer to be a greeter at one meeting, write an article for the Unit newsletter etc. By not overwhelming members with large projects, they will have the opportunity to adjust to learning and helping build their unit. If a member enjoys an experience they will most likely look forward to helping more.

As members are selected to chair committees, mentor them; offer help when needed; be prepared to support when asked; provide training sessions. Be positive and be sure to communicate with your committee members and stay open minded.

District: Schedule an ABC School in the district. If you have a large district, schedule two separate schools in different areas to increase attendance; include a nearby district in these plans and don't forget to invite Legionnaires and Sons of the American Legion.

Units: Must definitely encourage your members to attend any and all workshops. Explain to the members what the ABC is all about; to learn about our organization and its programs. Let members know that there is always something new to learn.

Conduct mini workshops at Unit meetings to introduce and/ or refresh information to the members. I am looking forward to seeing many more ABC schools before May 1, 2012....will your District be our next stop?
