Tommy was wounded during the December 1941 bombing of Wake Island — then captured and imprisoned in China, Korea and Japan. Finally, 76 years later, he finally received his Purple Heart. Tommy was a passionate supporter of many Auxiliary Programs, particularly Florida Girls State. After traveling with Space Coast Honor Flight to Washington, D.C. , Tommy became an avid supporter and advocate for the Honor Flight Program. September is National Suicide Prevention Month. The US Department of Veteran Affairs last report dated June 2019 stated that twenty (20) veterans commit suicide each day. One contributing factor is PTSD. PTSD (posttraumatic stress disorder) is a mental health problem that some people develop after experiencing or witnessing a life-threatening event, like combat, a natural disaster, a car accident, or sexual assault.

“A returning veteran can experience profound loneliness, surrounded by people who do not understand who they have become, and expect them to be who they used to be. While many veterans copy with this and eventually grow into a new life, when this loneliness is combined with mental illnesses such as PTSD and Gulf War Syndrome, their own mind can become a torture chamber from which death may be considered a welcome release.”

~ National Center for PTSD

Other factors can include drug and/or alcohol abuse, depression, other mental illnesses. Military Sexual Trauma is another factor. Keep in mind that Military Sexual Trauma (MST) does not only happen to female veterans.

SUICIDE WARNING SIGNS

- Hopelessness; feeling like there’s no way out
- Anxiety, agitation, sleeplessness, or mood swings

- Feeling like there is no reason to live
- Rage or anger
- Engaging in risky activities without thinking
- Increasing alcohol or drug misuse
- Withdrawing from family and friends

The presence of the following signs requires immediate attention:

- Thinking about hurting or killing yourself
- Looking for ways to kill yourself
- Talking about death, dying, or suicide
- Self-destructive behavior, such as drug abuse, carelessly handling weapons, etc.

How can we help? We need to be aware of the warning signs and be open to talking about them and suicide. Included on the following page, is a handout from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs on how to **SUPPORT VETERANS IN YOUR LIFE**. Please print it out for distribution to your members, veteran caregivers, and military spouses. It can be located on the Department website www.alafl.org under Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation program.

Another resource is the Veterans Crisis Line @ **1-800-273-8255** and **PRESS 1**. If you know a Veteran who is showing any signs of suicide, please call!

SUPPORT VETERANS IN YOUR LIFE

We can all play a role in preventing suicide: Your actions could help save a life. Here are simple ways to support a Veteran or Servicemember in your life or your community who may be going through a difficult time:

Learn About Resources

- **Call the Veterans Crisis Line:** If a Veteran you know is immediately at risk for suicide, **call 1-800-273-8255 and Press 1, chat online at VeteransCrisisLine.net/Chat, or text to 838255** for free, 24/7 confidential support.
- **Share a self-check quiz:** Help a Veteran assess whether mental health treatment would be beneficial by sharing the link to www.VetSelfCheck.org.
- **Help a Veteran facing homelessness:** Connect a Veteran with support by contacting the National Call Center for Homeless Veterans at **1-877-424-3838**.
- **Support a Veteran experiencing a substance use disorder:** If you are concerned a Veteran you know may be misusing alcohol, opioids, or other drugs, encourage them to take a confidential assessment and learn about effective treatments at www.mentalhealth.va.gov/substanceabuse.asp.


