Now that October is here and we are in full swing with working our programs, I'd like to share a little information that many of you may not know about Operation Homefront. Back in August 2011 a Statement of Collaboration was signed between the American Legion Auxiliary and **Operation Homefront**, which can be found on the National webpage. So basically, we're working towards the same goals, so let's work it together!

Have you ever thought of doing something, but you didn't know where to start or who to contact, been there done that! Listen, this is the time to start planning for your Holiday Meals for Military families, here's a note from our Operation Homefront Florida Program Coordinator, Beth McGregor to get you going.

"Holiday Meals for Military can be hosted for either Thanksgiving or Christmas (we've even had a few Easter events), whatever works best for the Unit. As you know, we typically try to provide all of the non-perishable items for a traditional holiday meal and accompany it with a \$25 gift card so the family can purchase a ham or turkey. I've seen the non-perishable packed a few different ways: some put the food items together in reusable totes while some bundle the food in a roasting pan and plastic wrap it. Both have turned out super cute!"

"We have a few different ways of handling it depending on where units are located and can either connect them directly with a military point of contact (POC) or make arrangements for families to come to them."

Either way, if you have a Unit interested, please send them my way."

Operation Homefront is there to help units connect with Military families through some programs such as "Holiday Meals for Military". However, with others programs such as the "Back to School Brigade" program and the "Holiday Toy Drive" that they do with participating Dollar Tree Stores, members need to register as a volunteer. Go to www.operationhomefront.org, and "Get Involved". Here's another message from Beth regarding the Holiday Toy Drive.

"Any volunteers that participated in the Back to School Brigade collection will receive an email around September 25th asking if they'd like to keep the same stores. If they want to keep their stores, they'll need to click the "Yes!" link in their email."

"I'll be able to make notes on the store list around the same time but can't create new profiles or reassign stores until the Rally Point website goes live to everyone on/around October 10th."

"If a Unit would like to pick up from a Dollar Tree location, please ask them to contact me and we'll try to connect them."

The holidays can be a lonely time for some active-duty service members who are unable to spend them with loved ones. Fortunately, they can lean on Operation Homefront (OH) and their military “family” to spread some cheer.

When Katie Reed married into military life in 2013, she was determined to make the best of all it had to offer, even during challenging times such as deployments and holidays. She and her husband, Curtis, an Army staff sergeant, also help other soldiers keep a positive attitude, inviting them over for meals and holidays as often as they can, especially single soldiers who may not have family nearby.

Feeling the pinch of extra holiday expenses, Katie was grateful she and other service members in a similar bind received assistance from OH’s Holiday Meals for Military (HMFM) event in Colorado Springs, Colorado, near Fort Carson. HMFM helps military families save money and time because they often face several other challenges. The program provides a large bag of nonperishable groceries and a gift card to buy protein for their holiday meal.

The Reeds were able to host six active-duty guests for Thanksgiving dinner. “It was a good bit of food,” enough to serve the whole group, Katie said. “Our family alone probably couldn’t have eaten all that food.”

“I think it’s great what you guys do,” Katie said. “The holidays are always crazy. Usually, a lot of people have to travel. It’s just such a help.”

HOLIDAY MEALS FOR MILITARY

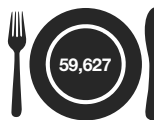
Operation Homefront’s Holiday Meals for Military program helps military families celebrate the holidays by providing them with healthy fixings for a traditional holiday meal.

The Holiday Meals for Military (HMFM) program started with a chance encounter and a spontaneous act of kindness. In 2009, at Thanksgiving, an executive of Beam Suntory encountered a military family in a grocery store near Fort Drum, New York. They were unable to pay for the groceries they had selected, and the Beam executive stepped in and covered the cost. From that act of appreciation from a grateful citizen, our HMFM program was born.

My name is Lisa Hoyland and I am honored to serve as your 2019 -2020 Legislation chairman.

This year as we are celebrating our 100th Birthday, we are Florida Strong! The Legislative Committee theme this year is "Take Action in Advocacy -Florida Strong".

Think of how we as American Legion family have advocated for 100 years to speak on behalf of our Military, Veterans and military families.

A few key points as you start your legislative year. American Legion Auxiliary follows the direction from the American Legion on our legislation priority items.

We are a non partisan organization, meaning we do not endorse candidates. This is important to remember especially with this being an election year. If you invite one candidate to your meeting/ event you need to invite all candidates running in the same race to the event.

How can YOU advocate?

First locate your elected officials. Go to congress.gov. or visit your local Supervisor of elections office or website for your area to obtain contact information for local officials.

Call your local elected officials office and invite him/ her to your Auxiliary general meeting or to a post family event.

Have you joined our Department Legislative Facebook page? Please follow us at FLALA Legislative to keep up to date and as soon as we receive this year's legislative priority agenda will be post there.

Encouraged your members to sign up for Legislative action alerts through Capwiz? www.capwiz.com/legion/home. This is a great tool to take action on a certain position or bill that needs our attention immediately.

Present legislative updates at your general meetings. Knowledge is Power, keep your unit members informed.

Your Florida Legislative Team will be hosting quarterly legislative meetings and we encourage you to join us. These will be via free conference call and dates, topics will be posted via Facebook.

This year as we celebrate 100 years strong. Download the 100 Year Proclamation found on the Florida legislative Program Action page and have your local official sign, then email me your photo with your elected official and the Proclamation so that we can recognize you on our Dept Legislative Facebook page. Your unit will also be recognized at next year's convention and receive a certificate of Participation.

Interaction between any elected official and his or her constituents is a crucial part of the democratic process. This is especially true for members of an advocacy organization such as the American Legion Auxiliary. We need for our legislative leaders to view American Legion Auxiliary members as a useful and knowledgeable resource when it comes to matters that concern the well-being of our Military, Veterans and Family. Building this relationship is done in a variety of ways, not the least of which is a regular correspondence between you and your member of Congress. Hearing the needs and concerns of their constituents is of the utmost importance to elected officials, as constituents are the people who decide



whether or not they remain in office.

When you decide to advocate it is important to consider your audience. You can call or e-mail them on behalf of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Things to Remember when Corresponding with Your Members of Congress

- Always be polite and courteous. Members of Congress and their legislative staff are considerably less likely to respond to rude or profane letters.
- Be as concise as possible. Remember that each congressional office has dozens of legislative issues to cover and hundreds of constituent requests each day.
-
- Include your home or work address in every letter, even in e-mails.
-
- Thank the member of Congress for taking the time to read your letter.
-
- Remember that correspondence with any elected official is about building an ongoing relationship and letting them think of you as a resource. Even if an elected official does not agree with your point of view on an issue, they might in the future. Some ways to get started in your advocacy efforts.

E-mails

E-mails are the most effective form of communication when advocating a Congressional office. Most Congressional offices now have standard e-mail forms that can be accessed right from the "Contact" tab of their website. Due to the heightened security measures on Capitol Hill, a letter sent through the post can take between two and four weeks to reach a Congressional office.

However, if you email that same letter, the office will receive it immediately. This is especially important when what you are advocating for is time sensitive; the best example of this is when you are asking the member of Congress to vote a certain way on an upcoming bill. If you mailed the letter, they would likely receive it long after the vote has passed.

Drafting Your Letter

Remember it is not generally the members themselves that read constituent mail, but their legislative aides. These legislative aides receive hundreds of e-mails, phone calls, and letters everyday regarding a wide array of policies, so it is important that your letter be as concise as possible in order to be effective. It is also helpful to use your own words and draft a unique letter for your correspondence with your elected official.

Calling Your Member of Congress

Calling your member of Congress is an effective way to advocate, especially when an important vote is coming up. As with other forms of communication between yourself and an elected official, members of Congress will only correspond with their own constituents out of professional courtesy to other members.

Please feel free to contact me anytime during this year as we advocate for our military, Veterans, families and community.

HOMELESS VETERANS

What can we do?

The things we sometimes take for granted, *i.e. toiletries*, are the items that we can donate to make sure our female veterans NEVER go without the bare necessities! The American Legion Department of Florida has asked for help with homeless female veterans. The Legion will distribute these all across the state of Florida whenever homeless female veterans are identified.

Please bring to Fall Conference the following items:

Tampons	Maxi Pads
Female Deodorant	Female disposable razors
Female Shaving Cream	Female underwear (new)
Female socks (new)	Female T-shirts (new)
Female shorts (new)	Female shoes (new)
Denture cleaner	Body wash
Bath soap	Shampoo

The American Legion will have a designated room for you to bring your items and drop them off. All Units will receive the **'ALA Strong'** Chairman's Certificate Award (refer to your VA&R Program Action Plan located on the Department website: www.alafl.org).

How To Raise Awareness About The Ever-Increasing Number of Homeless Veterans

1. First, learn about the homeless veterans in your area. Identify the needs of homeless veteran population in your area by contacting community organizations like shelters, food banks, and if available, a Veterans Administration Medical Center (VAMC).

2. If you have a VAMC in your area, work with the VAMC homeless coordinator to see what kinds of programs they already have in place and identify how your unit can help.
3. Use funds collected through the Poppy program to support the needs of homeless veterans.
4. Advertise the Department of Veterans Affairs help line for homeless veterans in homeless shelters, community centers, local hospitals, and mental health service facilities.

3 Projects Your Unit Might Consider

1. Host a stand down or Homeless Veterans' health fair. Contact your local VAMC homeless outreach coordinator or visit the National Coalition for Homeless Veterans website www.nchv.com.
2. Assemble Buddy Baskets for homeless veterans transitioning into housing. Visit www.ALAforVeterans.org for a How To Sheet that further details the Buddy Basket process.
3. Work with your Legion Family to develop a fundraising plan. These funds can be used for emergency housing, supporting local shelters, and supplying veterans with basic needs.

INTERVIEW WITH FRANCES RIDGLEY

Fran Ridgley became an American Legion Auxiliary member in December of 1964. She joined under the eligibility of her husband, Lloyd J. Ridgley. He was a WW2 Navy Veteran who served on the South Pacific from November 1943 until June 1947.

She recalls that he served on the smallest Sea Going Vessel LCI and spent his entire time in the back of the ship for unloading troops and going on to the next destination. She says she will never know how that 125-foot-wide and 180-foot-long ship made it from San Francisco to the South Pacific.

Why did you join the American Legion Auxiliary?

"Because my husband Lloyd, a veteran of WW2 and I wanted to be involved with the American Legion Auxiliary to see what it was all about. Lloyd had joined the American Legion when he first got out of service in 1948. When he passed away, he'd been a member for 70 years. I also had three brothers in the service and I just knew that being a part of this organization would be a way I could help support them as well as all veterans. I love being involved and helping with our veterans."

At the Unit level Fran has held several chairmanships which include Leadership, Legislative, Girls State (for 10 years and her favorite), and Poppy. She has also been 6th district chairman for National Security, Poppy, Community Service, Leadership, Legislative, Membership, and served two terms as the 6th district president.

Miss Fran has also held chairmanships at department

level. She was Constitution and By-Laws, Poppy Chairman, and National Security. The year that she was the Constitution and By-Laws chairman she was very determined and was on the phone a whole bunch of times to get everyone to get their information corrected. She was so pleased to be 100% in every Unit in Florida having their Constitution and By-Laws all up to date. She received a standing ovation for the feat as it was the first time in years that this had happened. The year that she was National Security she won the Best in the Southern Division for the program and the Dorothy Pearl Civil Service Award.

We asked if she had held any offices at Unit, District, and Department level. The answer to that was yes. At the Unit level she has been Vice President, Chaplain, Sergeant at Arms, Secretary, and President for at least 10 years. She was district president for two years. At the Department level Fran served as the Eastern Area President. She was also the VA Rep at Orlando Veterans Outpatient Clinic for four years.

When she was the District President, the Department President was Shirley Fraser, whose theme was "Enthusiasm, Teamwork, Knowledge the Key to Success" (note: the key was not to unlock but the musical key) to stay in tune, have harmony and compassion for one another. We also asked her how membership was that year. She said she remembers that Unit 286 had 226 members and that Lady Lake only had 32 members. She says, "That's a BIG change, huh?". The membership chairman that year was PDP Kat Rich and her theme was Noah's Ark. She said we did very well that year but can't recall the ending totals. When she was the Eastern Area President, Mary Heenan was the Department President. Mary's theme was "Making a Difference for our Children" (not the reading, writing, and



arithmetic of old) but, the respect, responsibility, and reliability.

When asked what changes she has seen over the years and what she thinks about them she replied:

When I first joined in 1964, Operations of the Auxiliary was very simple, as years have gone by, I have seen so many changes with the coming of computers and QuickBooks, which makes our life so much easier. This has made our wonderful organization in the future and progress, which is great. I feel we need to have more time spent with learning the programs, attending the required meetings, so members can learn their roles in the Auxiliary. I like to see a meeting conducted where you do not have to hurry for the "few" that would rather be somewhere else than at a meeting that last maybe an hour and a half. I get very irritated at the meeting when you are rushed to cover our programs and make success of our organization, the American Legion Auxiliary. It is only once a month, I remember when we had meetings twice a month and the members were very involved, you had time for the members, and it showed. We used to have cooperation and people desiring to learn.

As we move forward into our 101st year Fran honestly believes that the next year will be greater than ever before. **Why you ask?** Because we have

so many dedicated Officers within our Department and National and we have the latest equipment with which to work with, I know we will secede. I feel so blessed to have spent more than half of the first 100 years. It has been an honor to have served and be a part of the most wonderful organization.

Her most proud moment as an Auxiliary member was when Helen Gardner Past National President asked her to be the Flower and Corsage Chairman for the National Convention held here in Orlando. She really felt honored that she would have that much confidence in her to take on such a project. She started researching and getting bids for flowers and making the arrangements for deliveries at least three times a day. This was sixth month planning project. After she got all the information she had to get approval from National and once she got it she never felt so honored in her life. She said she felt so humble to be asked by such a special Lady. Then to top it all off the Legionnaires and Sons of the Legion, used my same florist. That was an opportunity of a lifetime. "I loved it and I love the American Legion Auxiliary". She hopes and prays that we have another 100 years of the wonderful organization.

She's so proud to have been a 50-year member of Pine Castle Memorial Unit 286 and a 6-year member in Illinois. I only wish I could do more, but my heart is always there, and always will be. God Bless us all.

William "Bill" Welser III

Before moving to Brevard County in 2006, Bill Welser completed a distinguished 34+ year career in the USAF, retiring as a Lieutenant General in December 2005.

A command pilot, he logged over 3,500 hours in the C-5 Galaxy, C-141 Starlifter, KC-10 Extender, T-1 Jayhawk, and 20+ other aircraft.

He has commanded at squadron, wing, headquarters, and numbered air force levels as well as holding numerous key staff positions to include a tour on the Joint Staff.

Especially noteworthy was his service as the Director of Operations and Logistics for U.S. Transportation Command where he led transportation operations supporting the U.S. response to the "911" terrorist attacks. There, he was the DOD's chief mobility architect for the air and ground war during operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom, directing all transportation requirements for U.S. forces and providing support for numerous coalition partners, while also enabling homeland defense.

In 2003, he then Commanded 18th Air Force at Scott AFB Illinois. As Air Mobility Command's warfighting numbered air force, he was responsible for tasking and executing all worldwide air mobility operations.

In April of 2006, Bill joined Northrop Grumman in Melbourne as Vice President Air Mobility Systems and Deputy Program Manager for the USAF Tanker Replacement Program. With a Tanker contract win, he became Vice President for Business Development for the mobility market segment of NGC's Aerospace Systems sector. With the ensuing protest and revised competition standards, NGC elected not to participate in the tanker re-competition.

At that time, Bill remained in Melbourne and served as an independent consultant working with the Air Force Technical Applications Center for six years.

Very active in the community, Bill is the past President of the Space Coast Honor Flight Board (2011 to 2018) and under his leadership the program expanded significantly making it possible to honor over thirteen hundred World War II, Korean War, and Vietnam Veterans by providing an opportunity for them to visit their monuments in Wash D.C. In 2018, he was elected to serve on the National Honor Flight Board of Directors. He also served on the Brevard Habitat for Humanity Board of Directors (2011 – 2016) and was the past Chairman (2013 – 2015). In addition, as a member of the Habitat electrical team, he is helping to bring affordable housing to deserving families. Additionally, he served as the 2016 Flight Captain for the Space Coast Order of Daedalians, an aviation fraternity. Bill is also an active member of the Patrick AFB St Georges' Catholic Parish and sings in the Choir.
