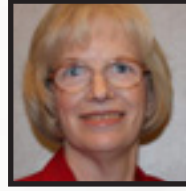

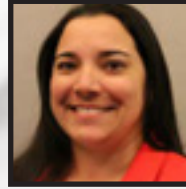
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Mission Statement

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The temperatures were dropping and there was a definite feeling of Christmas in the air as Department Community Service Chairman Jill Lux and I arrived at Jacksonville in early December to visit with District 5 members. After checking into our hotel, we met up with District President Annie Anderson for the beginning of a wonderful visit. Our first stop was in St. Augustine for dinner and a tour of this beautiful downtown area, that truly transforms into a Christmas village at this time of year. The sights and sounds were breathtaking, and it was so much fun to see everyone walking through town wearing their coats, a sight we don't see here in Florida. After a wonderful dinner, we headed to Unit 233 in Ponte Vedra Beach. We were able to visit with their entire American Legion family as they held their "Town Hall Meeting."

Day 2 began early, as Jill and I discovered that District President Annie is one punctual lady. I can assure you that Annie knows not only how to make a schedule but also knows how to stick to it. Our first stop of the day was at Clyde Lassen Veteran's Nursing Home in St. Augustine. We were given a tour of the facility and learned more about all the wonderful things they are doing to serve our veterans. We then traveled to meet with members from Units 194, 202 and 250. It was wonderful to meet so many enthusiastic members and learn about their accomplishments in fulfilling the ALA Mission.

On Day 3, the morning began with a visit to 5 Star, a transitional facility for veterans. After a tour of the facility, we shared an informative question and answer session with the director and found out how much this facility has helped local veterans return to a normal life. Carolyn Brown and Department 1st Vice President Wanda Brandt accompanied us for our morning visits, as President Annie comforted a dear friend during

her husband's funeral.

During the day, we visited Units 88, 137, 9, 197 and 283. Even though we were on a tight schedule, we managed to have time to interact with members and become excited about all the ALA miracles that were coming true, thanks to their efforts. Friday evening, we were able to join Department Commander Rick Johnson and Sons of the American Legion Detachment Commander Tom Klinger for dinner. We finally had the rare opportunity of being in the same place at the same time, taking advantage of the opportunity for some group photos.

Day 4, December 7th, brought us together again as we attended the Pearl Harbor Remembrance Ceremonies at Fleet Reserve in Atlantic Beach. It was a humbling and somber tribute to many fallen heroes. Commander Johnson delivered heartfelt words about what happened on that day in 1941.

Immediately following the ceremony, we hit the road to continue visiting with members from Units 54 and 401. The scenery driving to these destinations was breathtaking. On Saturday evening, while attending a holiday gathering, I was privileged to meet United States Congressman John Rutherford, who represents Florida's 4th Congressional District. I spoke with him about Honor Flight and the interest in adding Jacksonville to the list of Florida Honor Flight Hubs. He offered his full support for Honor Flight and agreed to help in any way possible.

We wrapped up a wonderful day with a Legion Family Meet and Greet at Post 316, Atlantic Beach, where we once again joined Commanders Johnson and Klinger. Liz Hill really made sure we all had a lot of great food to eat during our visit.

Day 5 started out with a Pajama Party Breakfast with members of Unit 283 in Jacksonville. I will never forget how hesitant Jill was to leave the hotel room in her pajamas. Although the food was great, it was nothing compared to watching these members put this breakfast in motion. Each member had their own "station" where different breakfast foods were prepared and served. I absolutely loved spending the morning with these ladies. The remainder of the day only got better, as we attended the 5th District Meeting, held at Post 129 in Jacksonville Beach. It was so wonderful to hear that this District has monthly meetings and that their attendance is great. The hard work, dedication and loyalty shown by members in the 5th District is second to none. I can honestly say that I was sorry to say goodbye to the wonderful Legion Family here. There was so much to see and do, that it couldn't be accomplished in one visit. I have been invited back, on my way to the 2nd District visit, to see more great things in action. I would be remiss if I failed to mention one person that helped Annie Anderson make this visit so memorable. American Legion Department Sergeant-at-Arms Jeff Durden was so very kind and helpful, to both me and Jill while we were there. I will always be appreciative for both Annie and Jeff for their gracious hospitality.

My time at home didn't last long until I was on the road again, this time traveling with District 12 President Karen Humann to District 1. We left early Tuesday morning for the 831-mile drive to Panama City to meet District 1 President Kim Edens. Because of the distance traveled, it was already late when we arrived, so the top priority was dinner, followed by a nice restful night. Once again, the cold weather had followed me on my journey. The first order of business found us stopping to buy some warmer clothing. Kim had mapped out her schedule for us and the first day found us visiting with Units on the eastern side of the Panhandle. We visited Units 356 and 375 before traveling to Clifford Chester Sims State Veteran's Nursing Home in Southport, where we met with Deputy Nanette Sullivan and other District 1 members for a very special visit. As we know, there are many veterans that would love to travel to Washington, D.C. with Honor Flight but have health issues that prohibit

this happening. Well, Nanette was determined to make Honor Flight a reality for the veterans at Sims, so she planned a "Flightless Honor Flight" for the residents. Members had covered all details thoroughly in making this day very special for everyone. The mayor was in attendance to present a Proclamation honoring 100 years of service by the American Legion Auxiliary. A local television station had a camera crew and reports stationed, to cover the event. You can only imagine my excitement later that evening, when this event was one of the lead stories! But, the most exciting part of this all was seeing the room filled with veterans that were having an enjoyable Honor Flight experience. I had taken a video of a previous Honor Flight trip with me and as I played it, I narrated the video to make it feel as if the veterans were traveling right along. District President Kim was the pilot and Nanette and members were flight attendants for the trip. After viewing the monuments, we enjoyed "Mail Call." Each veteran received a big stack of cards and letters to thank them for their service. After returning "home", veterans shared stories of their time in the military and some were very emotional. Each veteran received a door prize and snacks before returning to their rooms. I can't begin to tell you what a wonderful day this was!

After leaving Clifford Chester Sims, we visited with members of Units 392 and 402, to hear about exciting things happening there. It was a busy day, but our batteries were really recharged and ready for the next day to arrive.

Day 3 brought us to the Pandlehandles' central area. We spent the day with Unit 75 in Crestview, 221 in Niceville and 296 in Destin before driving to Ft. Walton Beach for the night. As always, I saw how passionate our members are for our veterans. Day 4 took us to Unit 235 in Ft. Walton, Unit 382 in Navarre and Unit 378 in Gulf Breeze. After our visits, we headed back to District President Kim's house, where we enjoyed some well-deserved pampering while sitting in front of her beautiful roaring fire. The following morning, we arrived at Barrancas National Cemetery, located at the Pensacola Naval Air Station, to participate in Wreaths Across America. A mood of sadness encompassed us all, following the horrific shooting that claimed the

lives of three young sailors just the week before. I was deeply touched to place a wreath at the final resting place of my friend, Past Department President Gerri Bailey. After laying the wreath, I removed my President's pin from my shirt and left it on her headstone.

After the ceremony, we visited with Units 240, 340 and 193 to complete a day of remembering and honoring. I always enjoy having the pleasure to see Past Department Presidents when I visit their Districts and seeing PDP Edie Harrington was no exception.

At the end of the day, while once again sitting by the fire, I reflected on my visit to District 1 and all the great memories and friends that I had made along the way. I am in total awe and amazement at the strength that so many members here have managed to hold on to after enduring Hurricane Michael. My prayers remain with so many of them that are still rebuilding their lives.

As a follow-up, I have some great news to add

about things that happened after my visits. Just last week, Bill Welser represented the National Honor Flight Board and attended a Jacksonville Honor Flight Organizational Meeting in Congressman Rutherford's office. There will be more meetings and planning to come. I hope that all members in the area will jump in and volunteer to make the dream of having a local Honor Flight Hub a reality for our veterans in your area. Please let District President Annie Anderson know if you can be a part of this exciting happening.

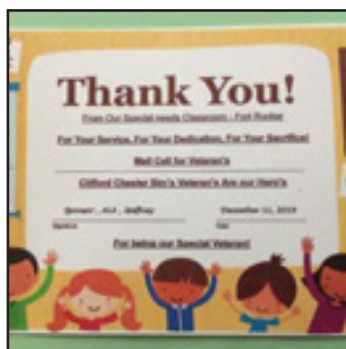
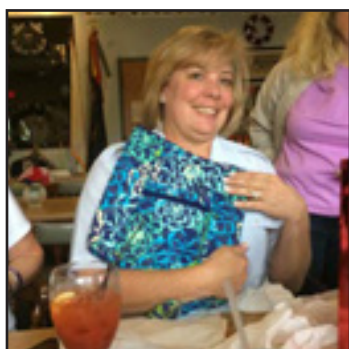
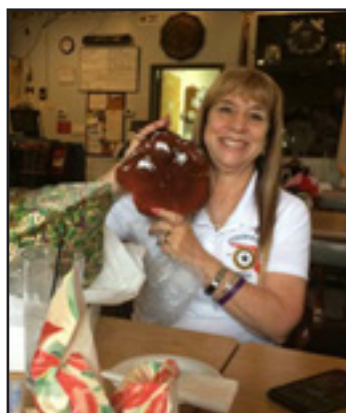
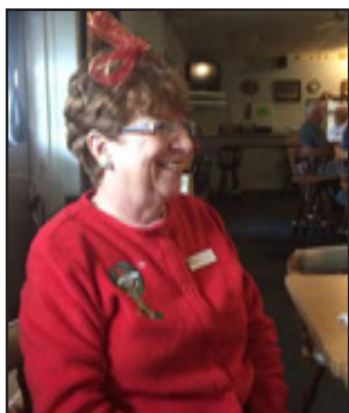

It was wonderful seeing the great turnout for Fall Conference. Your response to the Poppy Contest was amazing! Twenty-three Units submitted thirty-three Poppy wall and table decorations, everyone of them just beautiful. The winning entries were based on the number of raffle tickets deposited for each: 3rd Place with 70 tickets, the Flamingo by Unit 110, Port Charlotte; 2nd Place, with 88 tickets, the Flanders Field box by Unit 62, Stuart and in 1st Place with 97 tickets, the Shadow Box submitted by Unit 254, Northport. All in all, through your efforts, our Poppy Contest raised \$535 towards President Ann's project, Honor Flight. Thank you!

Before you know it, it will be time for Year-End reports, how time flies when you're having fun! Have you contacted your local schools yet requesting their participation in the Poppy Poster Contest? Don't forget to include your Juniors. Let's find a National Winner in Florida this year!! How about a Little Miss Poppy? Please review the Poppy Action Plan <https://alaf1.org/programs/poppies/> and <https://www.alaforveterans.org/Poppy/> for all the information you may need for a successful Poppy Program including the Poster Contest and Little Miss Poppy.

When submitting your Year-End Reports to your District Chairman please remember to include your narrative with the reporting form. Tell us your Unit's story about how your Unit distributed your poppies, how you spread awareness of the Poppy and what it means and, how you used your Poppy Funds raised through your Poppy distributions. Since Unit Year-End reports are due to your District Chairman by April 1st, 2020, reports should include all Poppy Program activity since last year's Year-End reports that were due April 1st, 2019. This would include any/all Poppy distributions since Memorial Day 2019 through April, 2020. Memorial Day, 2020 distributions should be included in next year's reports, 2020-2021. We know it's confusing,

but because of timing of report due dates your Poppy Program reports are based on activity from 4/1/2019 through 3/2020, a combination of last year and this year. For example, this year's report should include Poppy Program activity from Memorial Day, 2019 and/or Veteran's Day, 2019 plus any other activity since last your 2018-2019 Year-End report. District Chairman, please combine all your Unit's stories and numbers on your District Report due April 15th, 2020.

Special Note to District Presidents and District Poppy Chairman: Please remember the Centennial Poppy Project being sponsored by the National Poppy Chairman, Beth McGinn. Hopefully, you've already planned your contest and contacted all your District's Units. Your District's winning Poppy needs to be in my hands by April 1st for consideration. Truly looking forward to seeing each District's special Poppy.

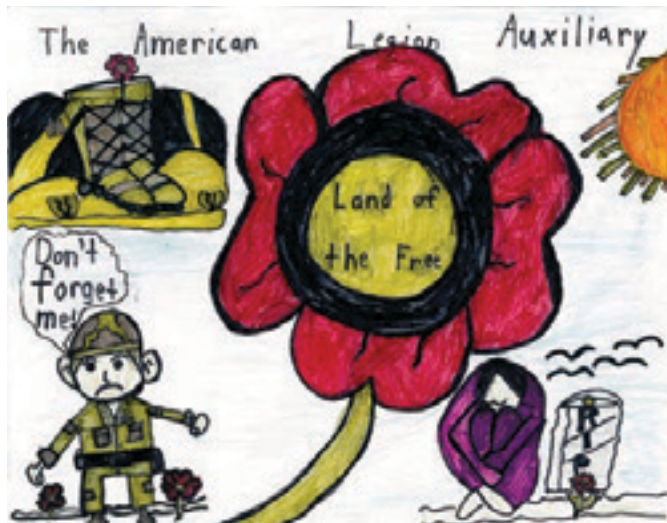

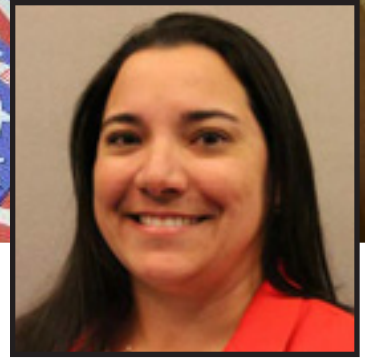

and I am sure President Ann King-Smith is as well. The District Challenges are so close it's gone to be a real "Rev Um Up" till the end.

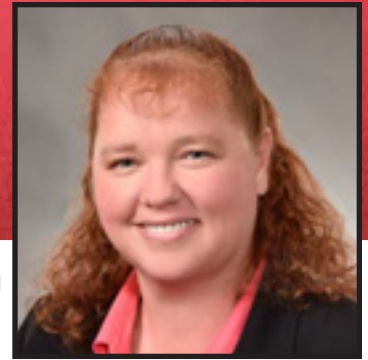

Girls State

We are in full swing with units registering for Girls State. I have sent an email out to all the units who have purchased slots regarding the next steps. We have remaining slots for purchase. If an unit has already purchased slots but would like additional ones please complete the over quota request form and mail it in to Department along with a check. Please note that Unit obligations must be paid to receive a slot.

After February 1, 2020, I will be mailing out the registration form that the delegates and alternates will use to register for Girls State. They will need to register online and upload all their documents. This year we are also requiring the original forms for the medical form, transportation form, and dietary needs form mailed to Department Headquarters after they upload them to the registration website. We will not accept these forms via email or fax. They must mail the originals to Department Headquarters.

Once the delegates and alternates start registering I will send updates to all Unit Girls State Chairman via email. Please check your email on a regular basis. The deadline for registration for the delegates/alternates will be March 15, 2020. Please tell the delegates/alternates not to wait until the last minute to register as it can cause their registration

to be denied if everything is not uploaded completely. It will be the units responsibility to let the delegates/alternates know if items are missing when the update is provided to the unit.

I will be mailing each unit a new form this year that will request the contact information for the delegates and alternates that they have chosen. Please complete this form and mail back to me as soon as possible. This will assist me if the delegate/alternate chooses the wrong unit number when they are registering.

I have been notified by National that some of the second renewal notices that were mailed out had errors on them. The amount due was incorrect. National is having them reprinted and mailed. Please note if you receive a call from a member or a check and the dues are short you can notify them on the error. If a member pays online the dues amount is correct on there.

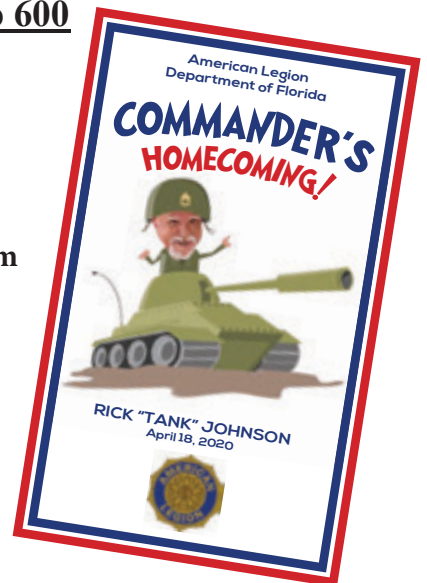

DORCHESTER CHAPLAINS:

***Lieutenant George Fox, Lieutenant Alexander D. Goode,
Lieutenant Clark V. Poling, Lieutenant John P. Washington, 1943***

The Four Chaplains were four United States Army chaplains who gave their lives to save other soldiers during the sinking of the USAT *Dorchester* during World War II. They helped other soldiers board lifeboats and gave up their own life jackets when the supply ran out; 230 of the 904 men aboard the ship were rescued. Life jackets offered little protection from hypothermia which killed most men in the water. Water temperature was 34 °F (1 °C) and air temperature was 36 °F (2 °C). By the time additional rescue ships arrived "...hundreds of dead bodies were seen floating on the water, kept up by their life jackets."

The chaplains, who all held the rank of lieutenant, were the Methodist Reverend George L. Fox, the Jewish Rabbi Alexander D. Goode, the Roman Catholic Priest John P. Washington and the Reformed Church in America Reverend Clark V. Poling. They were sailing on the USAT *Dorchester* troop transport on February 3, 1943, when the vessel, travelling in convoy, was torpedoed by the German submarine U-223 in the North Atlantic. As the vessel sank, the four chaplains calmed the frightened soldiers and sailors, aided in the evacuation of the ship, and helped guide wounded men to safety. The chaplains also gave up their own life jackets.

As I swam away from the ship, I looked back. The flares had lighted everything. The bow came up high and she slid under. The last thing I saw, the Four Chaplains were up there praying for the safety of the men. They had done everything they could. I did not see them again. They themselves did not have a chance without their life jackets.—Grady Clark, survivor
On December 19, 1944, all four chaplains were posthumously awarded the Purple Heart and the Distinguished Service Cross. The Four Chaplains'

Medal was established by act of Congress on July 14, 1960, and was presented posthumously to their next of kin by Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker at Ft. Myer, Virginia on January 18, 1961.

The chaplains were also honored with a stamp, issued in 1948 and by an act of Congress designating February 3 as "Four Chaplains Day."

Goode, Poling and Washington had served as leaders in the Boy Scouts of America.

VETERANS AFFAIRS & REHABILITATION

Last month I visited two veterans' hospitals, James A. Haley and Bay Pines. They are amazing hospitals that are helping our veterans in a multitude of ways.

About the James A. Haley Veterans' Hospital - Tampa, Florida

Activated in 1972, the James A. Haley Veterans' Hospital is a tertiary care facility classified as a Clinical Referral Level 1 Facility. JAHVH is a teaching hospital, providing a full range of patient care services, with state-of-the-art technology as well as education and research.

Comprehensive health care is provided through primary care, tertiary care, and long-term care in areas of medicine, surgery, psychiatry, physical medicine and rehabilitation, spinal cord injury, neurology, oncology, dentistry, geriatrics, and extended care.

JAHVH consists of five Veterans Health Administration facilities located in Tampa, New Port Richey, Zephyrhills, Lakeland, and Brooksville, serving four counties in Central Florida. It is a part of the Veterans Integrated System Network (VISN) 8 that also includes facilities in Orlando, Gainesville, Lake City, Bay Pines, West Palm Beach, Miami, and Puerto Rico.

The hospital treated almost 10,000 female veterans last year. Since it is a teaching hospital, private-sector physicians all over the country are more in tune with our veterans. The grounds are also home to two Fisher Houses, which total 36 rooms. I picked up a Wish List for these Fisher Houses:

- Monetary donations.
- Gift cards – To stores such as Bed, Bath & Beyond, Target, Wal-Mart, and national chain restaurants

such as Applebee's, Chili's, Cracker Barrel, Denney's IHOP, Outback, Ruby Tuesday etc.


- Kitchen items – Absorbent kitchen dishcloths and towels (earth tones), dish soap (preferably Dawn and in smaller sink sizes), dryer sheets, kitchen sponges (scrubby on one side), Tide laundry pods, Powerball dishwasher detergent, freezer tape, travel sized hand sanitizer.
- Paper and Plastic Goods – Paper napkins, plastic forks & spoons, durable zip-lock plastic baggies (2 gallon, 1 gallon, quart, and snack sizes), aluminum foil, travel size puzzle books, and small spiral note pads.

About the Bay Pines VA Healthcare System

The Bay Pines VA Healthcare System a level 1a, tertiary care facility headquartered in Bay Pines, Fla. Originally opened in 1933, the main medical center is located on 337 acres situated on the Gulf of Mexico approximately eight miles northwest of downtown Saint Petersburg, Fla. Co-located on the medical center campus are a VA Regional Office and a National Cemetery. This area is part of Tampa Bay, the second most populated metropolitan area in the state. The healthcare system operates nine facilities to include the main medical center in Bay Pines and outpatient clinics located in the Florida cities of Bradenton, Cape Coral, Naples, Palm Harbor, Port Charlotte, Sarasota, St. Petersburg, and Sebring.


The medical center and its outpatient clinics serve Veterans residing in counties in central southwest Florida to include Charlotte, Collier, Desoto, Hardee, Highlands, Hillsborough, Lee, Manatee, Pinellas, and Sarasota. Every year, the Bay Pines VA Healthcare System serves more than 108,000 Veterans while providing a full range of high quality medical, psychiatric, and extended care services in



outpatient, inpatient, residential, nursing home, and home care settings. The system is the 4th busiest VA healthcare system in the country in regards to patients treated or served.
