Do you know how to recognize a caregiver?

- Military caregivers helping Viet Nam era veterans and older tend to resemble civilian caregivers in many ways.
- Post 9/11 military caregivers

differ from pre 9/11 and civilian caregiver groups. They tend to be younger, caring for a younger veteran with mental health or substance abuse issue, employed, and not connected to a support group. They are more likely to use mental health resources and services, and to use them more often.

- Post 9/11 military caregivers typically help veterans who are dealing with stressful situations, and emotional and behavioral conditions.
- Post 9/11 military caregivers experience worse health issues and greater strains in family relationships. They also experience more workplace problems than non-caregivers.

What you can do to help!

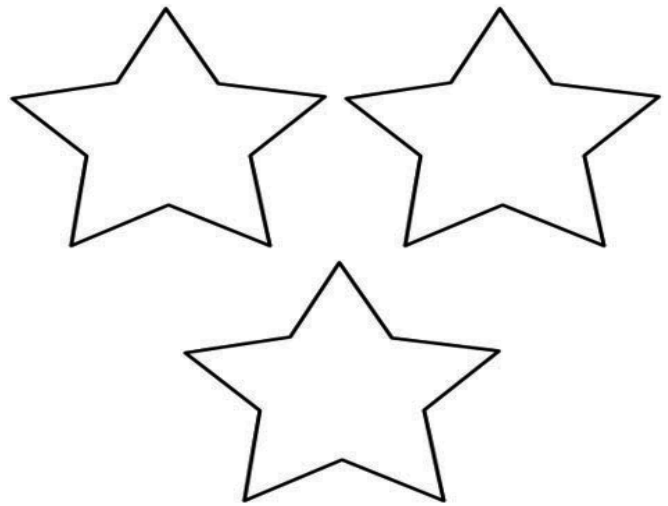
The Story of the Star Thrower

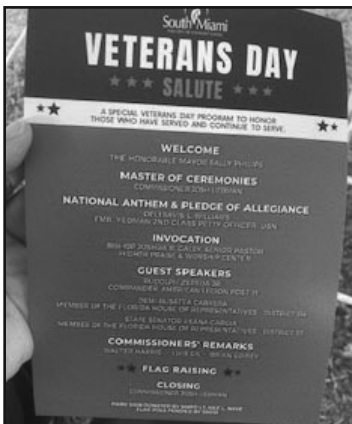

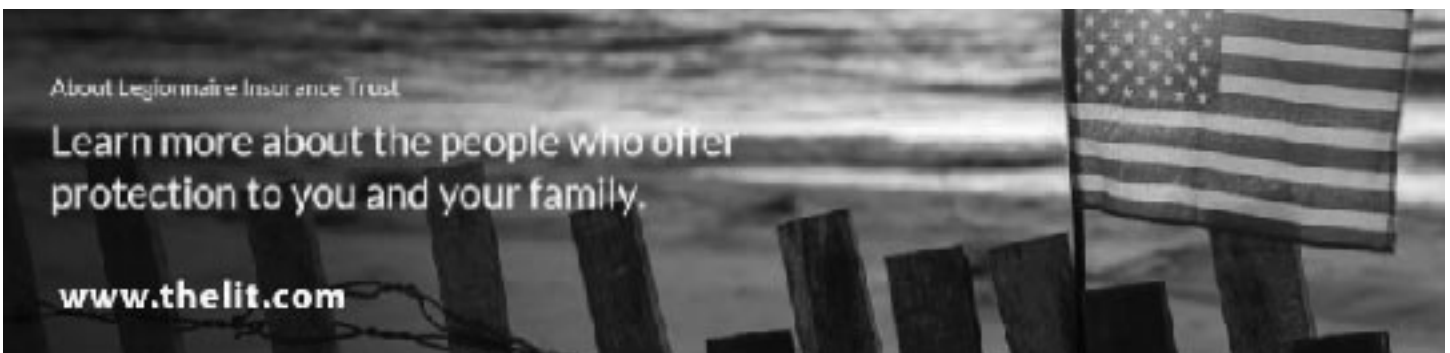

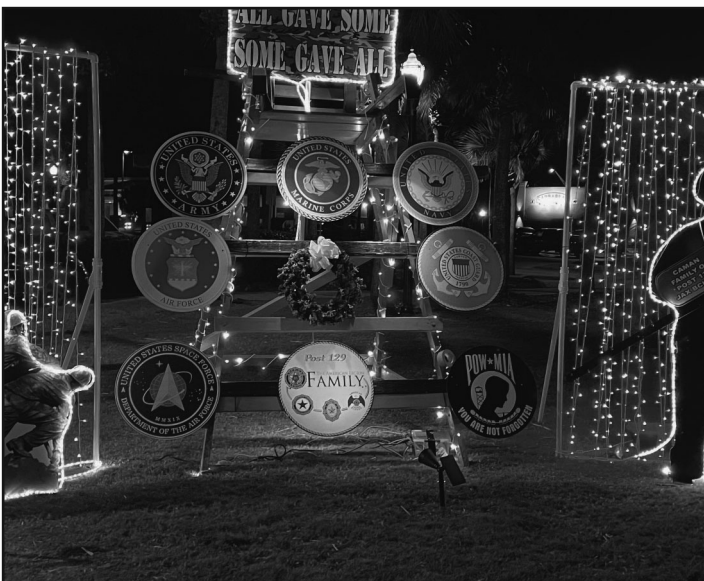
to Unit 129, Jacksonville Beach, District 5 seahorses with their 4th year of entry into Jacksonville Beach Deck the Chairs.
