Juniors (ages 8-17) will be invited to attend: Department Workshop, Fall Conference, National Jr's Meeting and will be installed at Convention as well as any events deemed for children such as a Juniors Camp, Children & Youth Activities and programs that they can assist with or participate in.

The charm of the Junior Activities Committee is that our Juniors can assist in every other committee that we have -

What can we do?

1. **MEMBERSHIP** - Build your Junior Activities program “one member at a time” by giving Junior members a voice and an opportunity to participate. Remember your Department of Florida membership goal is to gain 2 new additional members this year. What a great way to get your motor run’en and Rev Up membership! Get all eligible Girls to become Junior members. Just because most Jr. Activities require girls to be 8 years of age - please allow them to become members, *even at birth*. Ask Legion members to sign up their daughters, granddaughters or great granddaughters. They don’t have to live in Florida to be members here, sign-up your relatives as long as they are eligible. You can always find things for them to do, and if you offer to pay for their membership (annual fee which is cheaper than adult membership) you can make your membership goals quickly. Organize your own Juniors Group within your Unit - It only takes 1! If your Unit still has bank accounts set aside for juniors, utilize them to pay for members still on your roster. A certificate will be given this year to each Unit in the that has the biggest increase of Junior memberships 30 days prior to Convention.
2. **AMERICANISM** - Ask your Junior Members to assist at a meeting or event to say the Pledge of Allegiance or Sing the National Anthem. Value them as members! Teach Juniors to memorize and learn to recite the ALA Preamble, Children have great memories and once they learn it, they can help adult members say it. Don’t forget the Oratorical Contest, Flag Etiquette or the Americanism Essay Contest - Juniors from 3rd - 12th Grades, as well as ALA Girls State candidates can participate and could win the National Essay Contest. This year’s Essay is: *How can we address the health and wellbeing of our Veterans, Military and their families?* Follow the PAP under Americanism for information, deadline dates and specifics.
3. **CAVALCADE OF MEMORIES** - Your Junior can make a pictorial History book “scrapbook” with photos and memorabilia. Remember this is our Centennial 100th Anniversary of the American Legion Auxiliary and if Juniors want to find out the History of their Auxiliary Unit or a member that has been around a long time this would make a great submission or even put it into a shadow box to display. Follow the PAP under Cavalcade of Memories for deadline dates and specifics.

4. **CHILDREN & YOUTH** - Your Juniors can help set-up the Military Child's Table - and have it accessible so that your juniors can perform each part and help to educate the rest of your Legion family about the sacrifices that children of military must go through. Juniors can also participate in the Star Spangled Kids program which educates youth on the US Constitution and History of the United States. September 11th is Patriots Day and September 17th is Citizenship Day Make our Juniors feel Special with certificates to acknowledge or honor themes being Great American's! Wear Purple on April 15th or have Juniors participate in making crafts to celebrate the Month of Military kids day and month. Follow the Program Action Plan under Children & Youth for more information, deadline dates and specifics.
5. **COMMUNITY SERVICE** - Juniors can help in any activities including going outside the Legion Family. Encourage them to wear their ALA Branded apparel and participate in walks, nursing home visits and local events including other children organizations like Children's Miracle Network, Special Olympics, Scouts or Rotary Club Kids.
6. **EDUCATION** - Check out scholarships especially for junior members that are graduating or heading to college, trade school or even the Military. Some include: Spirit of Youth Scholarship, James H. Parke Memorial, Children of Warriors and Samsung for ALA Girls State attendees. Juniors can also partner with schools and donate for: Give 10 to Education, Box Tops or School Supply Drives, you can also ask the schools to see what community service projects they can assist with perhaps volunteer to read to younger students. Follow the PAP under Education for more details, deadline dates and specifics.
7. **ALA GIRLS STATE** - Make it a point to tell your Junior members that have completed their 11th grade to apply to attend ALA FL Girls State. 2021 session is to be held at FSU with a 2021 date to be determined. Just because of COVID-19 the Juniors that were selected this past year will be given a certificate.
8. **VETERANS HISTORY PROJECT** - Ask your juniors to start writing the veterans history Project by interviewing veterans either family members or neighbors. Juniors can also submit a written history to the Department Historian what they have been doing within their year. Follow the PAP under Historian for deadline dates and specifics.

9. ALA JUNIOR LEADERSHIP COURSE - Juniors can take the leadership course online through the ALAforVeterans.org website. Mentor them or be a Senior Sponsor to guide them through a committee or office. Allow them to have their own Junior meeting and teach them to use Robert's Rules of Order, but make it fun for them so it's orderly but not too much emphasis on protocol. There is also a Junior Activities Handbook available to use as a guide.
10. NATIONAL SECURITY - Juniors can participate or apply for: Youth Cadet Law Enforcement Program, CERT Civilian Emergency Response Training, Welcome Home ceremonies at Military Installations, Airports or at Legion Posts.
11. PRESIDENT'S PROJECT - HONOR FLIGHT - The Juniors have plans to participate and help to raise funds as well as write postcards for "mail call" for the Department President's project Honor flight. Donations are being sought for the Goodie Bags that the Veterans will receive before heading on their trip to Washington DC and each Veteran will receive at least one "Mail Call Postcard" to keep with Thank You accolades written on them. *Postcards were donated by: Thoughtful Cards a non-profit on Facebook that sends cards to anyone wishing one at no charge.*
12. POPPY - Encourage Juniors to "audition" for Little Miss Poppy (ages 6-12) Ask the girls to make table favors or wreaths and participate in the Poppy Poster Contest. Juniors can also be great helpers when you host your "poppy days" they can distribute poppies and collect donations. Juniors can also learn the story of the Poppy, recite In Flanders Fields or learn about Moina Michaels, the Poppy Lady.
13. PUBLIC RELATIONS - Utilize PR and different media sources by promoting what your Junior Members are doing - Newspapers & TV Stations love children, call your local radio stations, many have to give free PSA (Public Service Announcements) Also allow your Juniors to assist you in setting up a Facebook page, Instagram, Snapchat or other Social Media accounts. Juniors are very tech savvy and can help you set things up for your Unit or a separate Juniors Group or page. Check out the National Awards for a submission.

14. Post on Social Media all the exciting things that they're doing and let the Juniors help with posting. Children understand technology, Facebook: American Legion Auxiliary Florida Juniors, Ala Fl Dept, American Legion Auxiliary Juniors - just remember to post where you've been, not where you're going! We are also on Instagram = alajuniors and you can use hashtags **#ALAFJuniors** **#FLALAStrong** **#ALAJuniors** **#LegionFamily** or **#ALARockStars**
15. Participate and donate in supporting the Junior Activities Committee. Fundraisers are a way that the Juniors learn to budget and work towards a goal as well as manage their money and help raise funds for Veterans Programs or Military Families.
16. Celebrate our Juniors - make it a point to congratulate them on any accomplishment, be it a patch, event, certificate, something at school or honor an award. Offer them snacks or drinks or even host a pizza party, prom or girls tea.
17. **AND Finally the PATCH PROGRAM** - All Juniors, as well as young SAL Members can participate in this program. Not only will they be rewarded for their good deeds they will also be recognized at Department Convention for earning patches. The Patch Program activities can be found on the Junior Member Activities page in the Members Only section at www.ALforVeterans.org There are 3 different age groups and 11 different patches that can be earned.





Junior Activities Patch Program

American Legion Auxiliary Junior members can be active participants of the organization with the Patch Program. Regardless of where one lives, and whether she belongs to an active Junior group, Junior Auxiliary members can serve their communities, veterans and learn about patriotism, health, fitness and leadership through this program.

Each sheet explains the criteria and what a Junior member must accomplish in order to earn a specific patch. When the activities are completed, an adult or Senior member must sign the form to verify that the Junior has met the patch criteria.

There are three levels of patch criteria:

- Red—Level 1: Kindergarten through 3rd grade
- Gold—Level 2: 4th grade through 8th grade
- Blue—Level 3: 9th grade through 12th grade (or 18 years old)

SPECIAL JUNIOR PATCH

The National Presidents' Scholarship provides scholarships to deserving children of our nation's veterans and servicemembers who have sacrificed greatly due to their parents' dedication to defending America and our values.

A special Junior patch has been created for our Junior members to be involved in raising money for the National Presidents' Scholarship Fund. Help get the word out to all our Junior members! We hope every Junior will be involved in some activity to raise money for scholarships, which are funded by the Educating Children of Warriors Fund. Most Juniors will become eligible for this scholarship, so they may be personally impacted by their fundraising efforts.

Any Junior can earn this patch if she raises at least \$5 for each year she is old. For example, a 17-year-old would raise a minimum of $17 \times \$5 = \85 .

Donations can be raised a variety of ways. Juniors can solicit donations from family, friends, Legion Family members or contribute themselves. Fundraising activities can be coordinated, such as bake sales or other sales, etc. Funds can be raised individually or as a group, but each Junior receiving this patch needs to have raised the required minimum funds for their age. The goal is for the youth of our organization to be involved and aware of the scholarship project. Checks should be made out to *National Treasurer, American Legion Auxiliary* with *National Presidents' Scholarship* in the memo line.

Background Information



In a joint effort with the National Junior Activities Committee, we have developed a History Patch for our high school (9th – 12th grades) Junior members. These young ladies have an opportunity to work with, learn from, and take ownership of the American Legion Auxiliary history. It is important for them to understand that they are a part of the Auxiliary's history. By earning this patch, they may become interested not only in the history itself, but in preserving it as well, and become a unit's or department's History/Cavalcade chairman.

Step-by-Step Instructions

What can we do?

- Contact the department Junior Activities chairman and ask her to help promote this new patch. Make joint announcements at your fall/winter/spring meetings, division/district meetings, etc.
- Write an article about the patch for the department newsletter.
- Make a poster to promote the patch for meetings. Include the patch and activities list (see below).
- Encourage the unit History/Cavalcade chairman to promote this patch and work with their unit Junior Activities committee chairman.
- Find a high school aged Junior member and be a mentor to her as she works the activities to earn the patch.

8	Organize a <i>Veterans in Community Schools</i> presentation. Work with a veteran in your post, and find a school or classroom in which to make a presentation.		
9	Organize a library of past issues of <i>Auxiliary</i> magazine for your unit. Make special notation of issues with articles relevant to your unit or department.		
10	Start a Blue Star/Gold Star Mothers and Families database for your unit.		
11	Start an ALA Girls State database for your unit: who your unit sponsored, what offices the girls held, and if anyone went on to ALA Girls Nation.		
12	Start a Poppy Program History: Keep track of your unit's Poppy Poster Contest, Miss Poppy, and Little Miss Poppy winners. Make special notation of those who also went on to win at the department or national level.
