

K-9s For Warriors provides service canines to our Warriors suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress Disability, traumatic brain injury, and/or military sexual trauma as a result of military service post-9/11. K-9s for Warriors goal is to empower them to return to civilian life with dignity and independence. Training of one service dog for a veteran costs \$27,000.00. How to Plan a Powerful POW/MIA Remembrance Service

According to the Department of Defense's Prisoner of War-Missing Personnel Office, there are still more than 83,000 American troops missing in action. The American Legion Family is dedicated to ensuring that America's POW/MIAs be honored and recognized by conducting remembrance services on or about the 3rd Friday in September, which this year falls on September 15th.

Please invite your Legion Family and your community to attend this powerful ceremony where Americans are asked to pause and reflect on the sacrifices made by the military men and women who are imprisoned or unaccounted for as a result of their military service.

The remembrance service script is traditionally read by just one person -- an American Legion Auxiliary member (usually the Chaplain) or a Legionnaire -- and the table is set before the meeting begins. The entire remembrance service usually lasts 15 minutes. The full script for the ceremony and further guidelines can be found on www.alaforveterans.org/programs/national-security.

The POW/MIA table should be staged with the following items:

small table with a white tablecloth
plate, fork, knife, spoon
and napkin on the table
inverted water glass
chair placed at plate setting
vase with a single rose in it
and a red ribbon tied around the vase
slice of lemon on the plate and salt sprinkled onto the
plate
white candle in a holder, lit at the beginning of the

white candle in a holder, lit at the beginning of the ceremony

POW/MIA flag draped over a chair in front of table American flag on the table

A.L.A. LEGISLATIVE ALERT

H.R. 2765 PERPETUAL POW/MIA STAMP ACT Sponsored by Fl. Rep. Gus Bilirakis
To provide for the issuance of a forever stamp to honor the sacrifices of the brave men and women of the
Armed Forces who are still prisoner, missing, or unaccounted for and for other purposes.

Why should this bill be passed? The U.S. Congress finds that:


- 1. The Department of Defense reports that more than 83,000 service members remain missing since WWII;
- 2. The United States Government has an obligation to achieve the fullest possible accounting for the Americans who have gone missing while serving the country and to leave no one unaccounted for in future conflicts;
- 3. In 1982, the POW/MIA flag became the first flag other than the Flag of the United States to fly over the White House in Washington D.C.;
- 4. On August 10, 1990, Public Law 101-355 designated the POW/MIA flag as "The Symbol of our Nation's concern and commitment to resolving as fully as possible the fates of Americans still prisoner, missing, and unaccounted for in Southeast Asia." and
- 5. The POW/MIA flag should maintain continued visibility as a constant reminder of the plight of America's Prisoners of War and Missing in Action.

 What are the specifics of this Act?
- 1. In General In order to continue to honor the sacrifices of the brave men and women of the Armed Forces who have been prisoner, missing, or unaccounted for, the Postmaster General shall provide for the issuance of a forever stamp suitable for that purpose and depicts the National League of Families POW/MIA flag.
- 2. Definition For purposes of this Act, the term "forever stamp" means a definitive stamp which meets the postage required for first-class mail up to one ounce of weight, and which retains full validity for that purpose even if the rate of that postage is later increased.
- 3. Effective Date The stamp described shall be issued beginning as soon as practicable after the date of the enactment of this Act and shall not thereafter be discontinued at all. Please contact your Representative and ask them to support H.R. BILL 2765







