unimaginable courage.

Through my husband, I gained my eligibility, and through my father, grandfather, and great grandfather, I gained my deepest sense of purpose. I am proud of my husband's service, proud of the history my family has written through their sacrifices, and proud to stand in the Auxiliary honoring each of them.

FROM VETERAN AFFAIRS & REHABILITATION

It is hard to believe that December is already here. I want to sincerely thank everyone who worked so diligently in November to ensure our veterans felt our care and appreciation. The distribution of Caring Heart bears, care packages, and so many other thoughtful gestures truly showcased the heart of the American Legion Auxiliary and why our mission matters.

As the holiday season begins, it is critical that we show veterans extra love and support during these winter months. This time of year can be especially challenging for veterans who are isolated, either due to being homebound or because their residence in an assisted living facility or hospital makes family and friend visits difficult. Answering the call of "Service Not Self," it is our duty as American Legion Auxiliary members to help these isolated veterans feel loved and valued during the holidays. There are numerous ways ALA unit members can engage with veterans who may be alone. Together, we can ensure every veteran in your community feels appreciated.

IDEAS FOR HOMEBOUND VETERANS:

- Bring homemade goodies or snacks, or prepare and drop off a weekly casserole.
- Provide entertainment such as crafts, crossword puzzles, Sudoku worksheets, magazines, or books.
- Write thoughtful cards expressing gratitude for their service.
- Gift a Christmas stocking stuffer filled with items they enjoy or need.
- Provide warm necessities like hats, gloves, scarves, socks, and throw blankets.
- Give them streamers for New Year's and a new calendar.
- Organize a meal train.
- Help with grocery shopping, either by picking up the groceries or using a service like Instacart, and assist with any other errands they may have.
- Focus on conversation and companionship, lending a helping hand in any way possible.

IDEAS FOR VETERANS IN ASSISTED LIVING FACILITIES:

- Contact the facility in advance to determine what items are allowed inside; this will guide what type of care package items will truly benefit the veterans.
- Send a care package containing approved items. Popular examples include playing cards, puzzle books, journals, pens, lip balm, fuzzy socks, a knitted scarf, specialty teas, a handmade drawing, a handmade card, or an appreciative letter.
- Try to visit the veteran once a week.
- Spend time playing cards or engaging in creative activities together, such as painting or drawing.
- Be a supportive and listening ear.

IDEAS FOR VA RESIDENTIAL HOME OR HOSPITALIZED VETERANS:

- Ask ALA Junior members to create and deliver artwork to veterans at the VA facility.
- Give them thank-you cards, as well as Christmas and New Year's Day cards.
- Provide puzzles and books for entertainment.
- Keep them company and show kindness and compassion. Since you may be the only person visiting them during the holidays, strive to make a positive impact.






MEDICAL FACILITIES NEWS AND HIGHLIGHTS

I also volunteer at the **VA Multi-Specialty Clinic** in Daytona. I retired from the VA Medical Center in Augusta, GA, with 30 years of service to veterans in 2011. During my VA years I served as Business Manager for several Departments to include Surgery, Mental Health & Geriatrics and lastly Rehabilitation. Upon retirement I continued to serve veterans at the Augusta VAMC as a DAVA volunteer. In 2023 we moved to Port Orange, and I have been a member of the ALA, Unit 270, since 2023, 1 joined my father who was a WWII veteran and active VFW member. There has


DAYTONA OUTPATIENT CLINIC

Eleanor's first assignment as a rep at the Daytona Outpatient Clinic was working in the lab. Her duties were instructing patients where to go and what to do with their specimens. However, even though she loved talking with the veterans, she wanted more of a challenge. Lucky for her, she was about to get a dream position. Tony, the CDCE (Center for Development & Civic Engagement) coordinate asked her if she would like to volunteer at the PRRC (Physio social Rehabilitation Recovery Center) formerly known as the Wellness Center. This center was closer to home for Eleanor and she was familiar with what the veterans did there. The PRRC is a part of the Daytona Outpatient Clinic but it is in a separate building. This clinic helps our veterans who suffer from PTSD, TBI, Depression and abuse. Part of the therapy was to get the veterans back into society. It not only takes classroom group settings, it also takes socialization with the public. That's where we come into the picture. The medical team was very happy to see how the ALA interacts with the

When she arrived at the building, she introduced herself and was told by Steve, the Social Worker how to use the phone and showed two buttons that electronically opens the doors to the treatment rooms. With past call center experiences, this was a piece of cake until the day that she'll never forget. When answering the call, the man said he wanted to talk to the doctor but he wasn't available. He was in a group session and could not be disturbed. The caller said he wanted to commit suicide. She took a deep breath and listened to him. She had the patience that was needed at this crucial time. The call took about 30 minutes and she documented the conversation and gave it to the doctor. The doctor said to Eleanor that if she wasn't there to answer the call, who knows what would have happened. He complemented her and thanked her for the time she spent with him. Eleanor remembered that in the past that the Wellness Center was active in arts and participated in our Creative

pizzas were on the menu with plenty of leftovers. November is family day and this will be a Thanksgiving dinner for 40 people. The entire district 17 is involved in making the events a success. In December, there will be a Christmas party with a gift exchange. Each time when Eleanor and the ALA volunteers are there, the staff thanks each of them for the dedication to the program. FROM HISTORIAN



On Sunday November 16th, 2025, while visiting District 15 with Department President Robin Burk, I had the honor and privilege to visit USS Tampa Post 5. There I discovered something so moving and poignant that I felt the need to share it with all of you.

USS Tampa Post 5 is home to the American Legion Veterans **Cemetery.** The story behind this is quite moving. The first President of their Auxiliary Unit, Mrs. O.N. Bie learned of a Veteran that was dying and homeless and was destined to be laid to rest in a pauper's grave. She enlisted the help of other Auxiliary members they raised funds to purchase land with the intention of creating a cemetery where indigent Veterans could be laid to rest at no cost. This was not without a fight however, as a suit was filed to prevent the creation of a cemetery on the land purchased. The

suit was eventually dismissed and following WW II the Legion became involved with this project and after several years other lands were added, and it was agreed that the Legionnaire's and Auxiliary members of USS Tampa 5 would collaboratively

operate and maintain the Cemetery. To add to beauty of the cemetery there is a beautiful monument that has its own significant history. In 1940 the Memorial Monument that stood at the entrance of Memorial Highway was relocated to the entrance of the Cemetery. There are several other beautiful monuments and murals that add to experience of visiting. It was truly very humbling. The American Legion Cemetery has over 700 of our Nations Heroes interred. Every year they honor these Heroes with a ceremony on Memorial Day and participate in Wreaths Across America.

I encourage you to visit this gem if you are in the Tampa area, it will not disappoint. If you are on Instagram and would like to learn more about some of heroes interred here, please check out @americanbios and see what Drew Garcia has discovered and written about them.

DISTRICT 4 UNIT 16






DISTRICT 8 UNIT K11
