

HELLO MEMBERS!

During my district visits, I have received questions about conflict resolution.

Unfortunately, sometimes folks just cannot get along. We are all dynamic individuals and there is always a difference of opinion. We welcome that. That's how we grow, not only as individuals but as an organization! But it is the way we treat others that makes for a successful or unsuccessful outcome of disagreement. Whether it is obvious or not, allowing disagreements to fester creates stress on the entire unit. People come to meetings for the camaraderie and sense of belonging and fun. When they see the tension, feel the tension, the members may think twice about coming to a meeting or volunteering. Your membership will suffer if the discord continues unabated.

Remember, it is okay to disagree. It is not okay to bully, harass, mistreat, stalk, demean, threaten, yell at or

outcast any member at any time. As members, we **ALL** must sign and abide by the Code of Ethics and Code of Conduct agreements. They can be found on the Department website under Forms & Resources. I highly recommend that at Unit AND District meetings, from time to time, these documents are read, explained and re-signed by the members.

It is highly suggested that the two parties that disagree, meet and speak, perhaps with a non-partisan arbitrator, to discuss the issue in a neutral atmosphere, and discuss the issue in a calm, collected manner. Unless these parties meet and speak to each other, there's little chance that the issue is going to be resolved, no matter what the Department suggests as a resolution to the discord. We encourage members in conflict to state their case without attitude, listen to the other side, and come to a compromise or agreement as to how you are going to proceed. U D & R will be asking if this conversation has taken place before they intercede. Please be advised, that if you need the Department to help resolve issues, contact Janet Woods, our UD & R chairman. Complete the UD & R form that can be found on the website and submit it to her. It is imperative that the request is signed.

Speaking of schedules. Girls State Chair Gail Dupuis has included the most recent District Orientations meeting dates with times and locations in this Newsletter – check it out!

This year Girls State Registration will be electronic. Your Delegate(s) and Alternate(s) will Register on-line [with their provided assigned number(s)]. Forms will be acknowledged, signed and submitted. Upon completion, the forms will then be sent to the Parent/Guardian for acknowledgement, signature and submittal. Once both sets of forms have been completed and returned, a Confirmation Welcome email will be sent with instructions for "next steps" and requirements. Remember: ALL Girls State Delegates and Alternates MUST attend an Orientation WITH their Parent/Guardian!!

It's that time of year for 2026-2027 Unit Officer Nominations.

You must follow your Unit's governing documents as to how the nominations are done. Unit Officers are elected annually, not more than 90 days and no less than 15 days prior to Department Convention.

These Officers will be certified by Department Headquarters no less than 10 days prior to Department Convention. Certification must be made on the form furnished by Department Headquarters at alafl.org/unit-officer-list.

If you are running for a Department Office, you will need to send your endorsement letter via certified mail to Department Headquarters, return receipt requested. To be endorsed as a District President, you would have had to serve as Unit President for your Unit. If not, you can be nominated at the District Constitution Conference. **NOTE: There can be NO Campaigning for District President, by any member, if you are being nominated at the Constitutional Conference.**

Continue to log your hours and activities for the Unit Impact and Committee year-end reports; due to District Chairmen 4/1/2026 – No Foolin'! Research the criteria now for any Awards you or your unit may be eligible. Watch for any deadlines for donation remittance requirements. If you have questions, reach out to the Committee Chairman!



This month, I want to begin with a sincere thank you. We did it! I set a goal of 80% to begin 2026, and we did just that. As of today, we are currently at 84.41% membership, and that number represents countless phone calls, conversations, reminders, follow-ups, and genuine care for our members. Your dedication to membership has been inspiring, and it shows in the steady progress we continue to make together as we work toward our goal of 100%. We are currently at 2341 members processed over from this time last year. That is an extraordinary accomplishment. Our membership campaign this year has centered on telling our membership stories; the reasons we joined, the veterans who inspired us, and the programs that keep us involved. Over the past few weeks, that focus has truly come to life. I have loved seeing how our members are sharing their stories and reminding others that they belong and that their presence matters.

This last month I also took time to

spotlight our different membership groupings, recognizing that every Unit faces unique challenges based on its size. Whether a Unit has 10 members or 600, the work is important, and every renewal counts. It was especially exciting to see our first large membership group reach 100% on January 13th! Reaching 100% with a large roster takes persistence, teamwork, and a deep commitment to every member, and that achievement deserves recognition.

Now comes what is often the hardest part of the membership year. At this stage, the members who have not renewed are not procrastinating; they are simply expired. This is the time when intentional outreach matters most. A friendly reminder, a personal conversation, or a simple nudge can make all the difference. Here are a few proven tips to help your Unit continue moving toward 100%:

- **Use your bartenders.** They know everyone. Ask bartenders to check membership cards and continue providing them with an updated renewal list.
- **Keep up the reminders.** Phone calls, texts, and emails still work—especially when they come from someone familiar.
- **Set up a membership table on busy nights.** When a Legionnaire renews, encourage their spouse to join or renew as well.
- **Use social media consistently.** Post reminders and do a weekly percentage countdown so members can see the progress and feel part of the momentum. As we continue this journey toward 100%, I am excited to introduce a new part of my membership segment that I'm bringing to you from Facebook: highlighting our members and their stories. Membership is more than a number; it is people. Each member has a reason they joined and a reason they stay, and those stories are the heart of our organization. Moving

forward, I will be sharing member stories that reflect the passion and dedication found across our Department.

Thank you for the energy, effort, and heart you bring to membership every day. Let's keep reaching out, keep renewing, and keep sharing the stories that connect us all. Together, we are closer than ever to reaching 100%.



February is full of meaning, and for Public Relations, it's a prime opportunity to turn mission moments into visible impact. Today's audiences don't just want to know what we do; they want to see why it matters and who it helps. That's where smart, intentional storytelling comes in.

This month, focus on connection-driven content. Short stories, real faces, and authentic voices outperform polished graphics every time. A single photo with a heartfelt caption, a Veteran quote, or a behind-the-scenes moment from a unit activity can go further than a perfectly staged post. Think human first, hashtags second.

What's Trending in PR & Social Right Now

Micro-stories: One photo. One paragraph. One clear takeaway.

Faces over flyers: People connect with people—include members, Veterans, families.

Purpose captions: Always answer three questions: Who are we? What did we do? Why does it matter?

Cross-post smartly: Share on unit pages, Department groups, and community pages, then tag partners when appropriate.

February also lends itself naturally to **Americanism, Black History Month, and remembrance storytelling.**

Highlight African American servicemembers past and present. Share stories of unity, sacrifice, and service that reflect our values. If your

unit recognizes events such as Four Chaplains Day, document it; photos and a short write-up make powerful content for both social and local media.

Public Relations doesn't stop at posting on Facebook; **now is the time to:**


- Interview a local Veteran or Auxiliary member and pitch the story to community media
- Write a short letter to the editor explaining who the Auxiliary is and why your work matters
- Capture content now that can be used later in end-of-year reports and contest submissions

When writing for media, always include a brief organizational close that explains the mission of the American Legion Auxiliary clearly and simply. Clarity builds credibility.

Public Relations is not about perfection; it's about presence. **Show up. Share the story.** Let the mission speak through your actions. When we tell our story well, we don't just inform; we inspire.

There was a time when I believed being "broken" meant I had nothing to offer as a leader. I thought leaders were supposed to have all the answers, unshaken confidence, and lives untouched by hardship. But my journey in the American Legion Auxiliary taught me something far

more meaningful: brokenness does not disqualify us from service—it prepares us for it. Many Auxiliary members come to our organization carrying stories of loss, sacrifice, and perseverance. We serve because we understand sacrifice personally—whether through our own challenges or through the experiences of the veterans and families we support. Those moments that once made us feel weak often become the very reason we lead with compassion.

Leadership in the American Legion Auxiliary is not about perfection or titles. It is about service. It is about showing up, even when we feel uncertain, and offering our time, talents, and hearts to others. Our struggles teach us empathy. Our setbacks teach us patience. Our healing teaches us how to uplift those around us.

A leader shaped by brokenness listens more deeply. She mentors with understanding. She encourages participation rather than demanding perfection. In the Auxiliary, this kind of leadership strengthens units, builds trust, and ensures that no member

feels unseen or unvalued. Many of us did not step into leadership roles believing we were ready. We grew into them—supported by fellow members, inspired by our mission, and guided by the Auxiliary's commitment to veterans, military members, and their families. What once felt like failure became wisdom. What once felt like doubt became purpose.

The American Legion Auxiliary thrives because ordinary men and women choose to serve in extraordinary ways. Our organization is strongest when we recognize that leadership comes from experience, growth, and heart—not from having it all together. If you feel broken, unsure, or hesitant to step forward, know this: you belong here. Your story matters. Your resilience matters. And your willingness to serve may inspire the next leader to rise.


Together, we turn brokenness into strength—and service into lasting leadership and a beautiful bond within the American Legion Family.

Scholarships

The Auxiliary has four scholarship funds that members and non-members are eligible to apply for. Deadline to apply online is March 1.

- **Children of Warriors National Presidents' Scholarship** - 15 scholarships of \$5,000 each
- **Non-Traditional Student Scholarship** - Five scholarships of \$2,000 each
- **Spirit of Youth Scholarship** - Each department/state awards one \$1,000 scholarship. From these recipients, the National ALA Education Committee selects five for a \$5,000 scholarship instead of the \$1,000 scholarship.
- **Member Loyalty Scholarship** - Ten scholarships of \$2,500 each, awarded to current college students who were Junior members and retained their membership into adulthood.

Per IRS regulations and the VA&R National Handbook, VA Representatives, Deputies, District Chairmen, and District Presidents **cannot request gift cards or monetary donations**. Units wishing to donate funds should use the **Donation Remittance Form** on the Department website (Quicklinks & Forms & Resources & Unit Forms). Funds may be designated for a specific facility and purpose. Let's start the year strong by serving, supporting, and showing appreciation for our veterans. Serving With Heart: Supporting Our Veterans at James A. Haley and Baldomero Lopez

A Commitment Close to Home

Hello, members.

My name is Barbara Bird, and I serve as the American Legion Auxiliary State of Florida Representative for James A. Haley Veterans Hospital in Tampa and Baldomero Lopez Veterans Nursing Home in Land O' Lakes. I am fortunate to live within twenty minutes of both facilities, which allows me to remain actively involved and responsive to their needs.

I am a mother of four and a grandmother, and before stepping into this role, I spent twenty-one years as an Administrative Assistant at Vanderbilt University Medical Center, supporting six clinics. During that time, I often managed staffing challenges, worked closely with physicians who were military veterans, and was frequently responsible for communicating important updates before they were announced hospital-wide.

In my office, I kept a dancing bear that played "Let the Sun Shine" and a sign that read, "What happens in here stays in here." Staff members having a bad day knew they could stop by, vent, and regroup. Healthcare offices can be emotional places. My approach was simple: better they talk to me than we all get fired.

Baldomero Lopez: Showing Up Where It Matters

As the State of Florida ALA Representative for Baldomero Lopez Veterans Nursing Home, I attend as many events as possible alongside other volunteers and assist wherever help is needed. I also volunteer for Bingo three times a month, which remains a favorite activity for many residents. Over the past year, we brought in music for an afternoon that turned into a walk-through Christmas caroling event, reaching residents throughout the facility and bringing joy to many who might otherwise miss group activities. Several times this year, I assisted fellow auxiliary members with unloading large deliveries. I also helped shop for items for Christmas, Thanksgiving, and other special events, helping ensure residents felt remembered and celebrated.

A Moment That Mattered

One of the most meaningful moments this year occurred when a television went out in a critical care area where residents cannot move around easily. I was notified by the nursing home and immediately contacted Lisa Hoyland, our Dept VA&R Chairman. Although she was driving to Tallahassee for another ALA event, she secured the purchase and arranged delivery in less than two days. WOW — more than I ever expected. She is truly on my friends forever list. The facility benefits greatly from funds provided through member donations submitted on the Department of Florida Remittance Form. These funds allow us to provide items so all residents can benefit.

James A. Haley: Collaboration in Action

The ALA Department of Florida also funded Christmas items for James A. Haley Veterans Hospital. Volunteers prepared one hundred holiday bags, each containing a medium-fleece

blanket, a privacy bag, and an undershirt, all placed in red-and-white bags with a note.

We were joined by Lisa, a hospital representative, the State of Florida American Legion Hospital Representative Carlos Gill, and other volunteers. The gratitude expressed by the patients was incredibly moving and reminded us why this work matters. In addition, I attend Friday night Bingo at James A. Haley every week, sponsored by the American Legion and supported by dedicated volunteers working together for our veterans.

Honoring Women Veterans

This year, James A. Haley also hosted a Breast Cancer Survivors Celebration for female veterans. As a hospital representative and volunteer, I was honored to attend. The event included valuable information, inspiring speakers, and meaningful opportunities to connect with female veterans and hospital staff. Experiences like this strengthen our outreach and deepen our understanding of those we serve.

United in Service

Throughout the year, I also participated in and collaborated on several other events, including the Veterans Parade and Last Call events (for two consecutive years), as well as Last Call for another veterans' organization.

I truly believe in collaboration of effort. Working together with other organizations and volunteers strengthens our ability to serve our veterans effectively.

Every time I leave the hospital or nursing home, I thank God for placing me on this path. There are things we think we understand, but until we experience them firsthand, we cannot fully grasp the depth of the pain our veterans carry. Serving them is both a responsibility and a privilege.




